THE MAGIK THEATRE LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

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We at Magik Theatre recognize the complex history of the land we reside on. What we now call San Antonio, Texas has been the home of many Indigenous Peoples, still is, and will continue to be home to many Indigenous Peoples.

We acknowledge that we are on the traditional land of the Coahuiltecan People. We are on the ancestral homeland of the <u>Tāp Pīlam Coahuiltecan Nation</u>. Being located in the current day Yanaguna Garden of Hemisfair, it is important to note that Yanaguana is the traditional name of San Antonio, meaning 'Land of the Spirit Waters'. Yanaguana is the ancestral homeland of the Tāp Pīlam Coahuiltecan Nation, a collective of affiliated bands and clans including the Payaya, Pacoa, Borrado, Pakawan, Paguame, Papanac, Hierbipiame, Xarame, Pajalat, and Tilijae Nations.

We acknowledge that we are on the traditional land of the Plains Jumanos People.

We acknowledge that we are on the traditional land of the Tonkawa People, who refer to themselves as Tickanwa-tic, meaning 'real people'.

We acknowledge that we are on the traditional land of the Lipan Apache of Texas People, also known as Ndé Kónitsąąíí Gokíyaa. One band that lived on these lands was the The Sun Otter band, or Tche shä.

We acknowledge that we are also on land that was home to the Comanche People, who called themselves Nermernuh, meaning 'the People'.

We live on land that is no stranger to migration, land that has been, is, and will be home to many Indigenous Peoples.

Land Acknowledgement is the first step in building good relations with the Land, and the Indigenous Peoples who have lived, are living, and will live on it. We are committed to continue learning about the Land and the Indigenous Peoples of it, and how we can further support them.
